In 2021, the ASFLA conference will be held at Macquarie University, and convened by Cassi Liardet. Many thanks to Ken, Kate and Cassi for taking on the hosting.

From Queensland, Lindsay Williams reports:

- A great deal of effort has gone into implementing a suite of new Senior syllabuses, with the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment authority's new English syllabuses still organising their objectives according to the Language in Use model - which was first used in Queensland syllabuses in 1987.
- Along with Dr Kelli McGraw and Sophie Johnson, I've been involved in writing a textbook, *English for Queensland*, for Oxford University Press. This explains the Language in Use model up front and incorporates knowledge about genre and language grounded in another Oxford publication, *Teaching Language in Context* (second edition) by Bev Derewianka and Pauline Jones and drawing on work by a range of other SFLers, including Sally Humphrey and Mary Macken-Horarik.
- Garry Collins recently presented a workshop analysing the prologue of *Romeo and Juliet* through an SFL lens at the Shakespeare Reloaded conference at Sydney University.

**Making connections: Looking out,

We are pleased to announce the first call for papers for the 2019 Australian Systemic Functional Linguistics Association Conference, to be held at The University of Sydney from Wednesday 2nd to Friday 4th October. The pre-conference institute will run between Monday 30th September – Tuesday 1st October. The conference will be linked with the Sydney Centre for Language Research (SCLR) at the University of Sydney.

As this year is the UNESCO year of Indigenous Languages, the conference theme will be 'Making connections: Looking out, looking in, looking forward' to celebrate the Indigenous languages of Australia and overseas as well as SFL's links with other disciplines. More broadly, the program will reflect bilingual education in Indigenous languages, the deep concerns of Systemic Functional Linguistics for both descriptive and theoretical issues in language and semiotics, as well as highly practical approaches to applied areas such as clinical linguistics, educational linguistics, computational linguistics and the digital humanities, and translation.

Call for papers:

We are inviting the submission of abstracts related to the conference theme on a broad

and inclusive basis. We particularly encourage submission of abstracts from early-career researchers, including postgraduate research students and postdoctoral researchers, and those coming in from overseas. All proposals will be peer-reviewed by the conference program committee.

Presentation format

- Full papers consist of a 30-minute talk followed by five minutes for questions and discussion. The word limit for abstracts is 250 words (excluding the word count for references).
- Colloquia: As we will only have space for a small number of colloquia, please email us separately if you intend to submit a proposal for a colloquium and we can discuss it.

- Extended deadline for abstract submission: **May 6 2019**
- Notification of acceptance: 20th May 2019

ALS2019 Call for Panels and Preconference Workshop Sessions



The 2019 conference of the Australian Linguistic Society (ALS2019) will take place at Macquarie University in Sydney, on 11-13 December 2019, with pre-conference workshops to be held on Tuesday 10th December.

The Australian Linguistic Society acknowledges the International Year of Indigenous languages by proposing for its 2019 conference the overarching theme: Celebrating Diversity. We will celebrate the diversity of Indigenous and non-Indigenous languages, in Australia and elsewhere, as well as the diversity of people who engage with these languages, or with linguistics, broadly conceived. Although proposals that resonate with the theme Celebrating Diversity will be especially welcome, proposals may be on any topic relevant to the interests of members of the ALS.

Proposals for themed panel sessions within the main conference (11-13 Dec) and pre-conference workshop sessions on the 10th of December: proposals can be for single sessions (90 minutes), double sessions (2 x 90 minutes)

or all-day sessions (3x90 minutes). Whether for the themed panel sessions or the pre-conference workshop, proposals should include: (1) Title, (2) Outline and Motivation (200 words max), and (3) Outline of the full planned proceedings; this may include specific speakers/titles for talks, or intended profiles of who/what is to be included, and whether you plan to do a public call for papers.

Workshop and panel convenors will be fully responsible for ensuring quality through the appropriate process of review, selection, and for organisation of constituent paper presentations. Themed panel and workshop proposals will not go through the EasyChair review procedure that the stand-alone ALS2019 papers will go through. However, if an abstract is not accepted for a specific panel/workshop, the panel/workshop organisers may forward it on to the main ALS conference for consideration. Please send your proposal to conf@als.asn.au. The deadline for proposals is **Friday 17 May 2019**.
